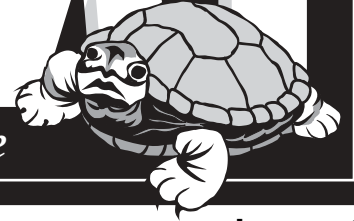

Lodge Approves Increase in Annual Dues

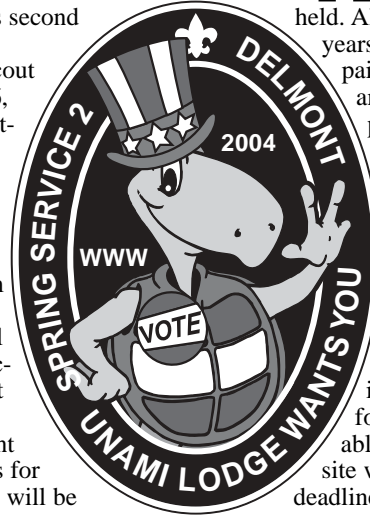
At its March meeting, the Lodge Executive Committee voted and approved a motion to increase the annual dues from \$7 to \$10 effective with the next Lodge Program Year which begins on July 1, 2004. Every member of the Lodge should pay their annual dues during the month of July and that makes them a member in good standing through June 30th of the next year. Being a member in good standing allows you to wear the Lodge flap on your uniform. It also includes: a membership card for that year; all lodge mailings; the opportu-

"The arrow has a target." — E. Urner Goodman

The truth in these words spoken by our founder cannot be denied. Whether it is the young scout taking aim at the bulls-eye at the end of the archery range or the Lenni Lenape warrior taking aim at the deer that will feed and clothe his tribe, the arrow has a target.

And yet, there is a deeper meaning to that simple statement that is more important for us as members of the Order of the Arrow. As members of this brotherhood, we must examine our feelings and motivations and discover what drives us. What is our target? I know there are as many answers to that question as there are brothers in our Order. I would still like to offer you what I believe to be a good target.

Arrowmen of all ages have a tendency to forget the ideals and lessons of the OA in their everyday lives. Serving others and providing good leadership are qualities that should be practiced together and at all times. It is a wonderful thing to see hundreds of Arrowmen at a Spring Service weekend leading others through their serv-

ice, but it is an even better thing to see hundreds of Arrowmen leave a Spring Service weekend and take that servant leadership out into their troops and communities.

What is servant leadership? Servant leadership is based on the principle that the one who is first to lead is also the first to serve. Let me see if I can clarify that with an example. A few years ago I worked on the crew of the Handicraft center at Treasure Island. Throughout the summer there were all sorts of unpleasant things that needed to be done around Kiwanis Lodge. The Handicraft director made an agreement that summer with the crew that he would not ask us to do anything that he himself would not do. More than just saying it, he backed it up. When some project came along, my director would be the first one to do what had to be done. I was inspired and motivated by that director and so was the rest of the crew. The director of Handicraft that year showed us how to serve and that was his greatest achievement as a leader. The next

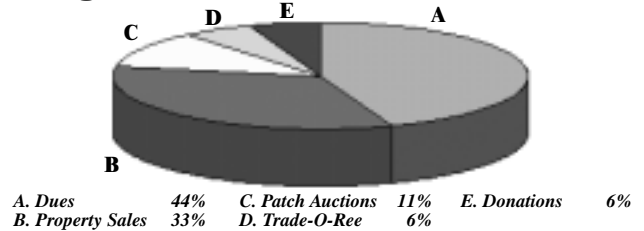
nity to purchase Lodge properties, attend Lodge events, and hold positions of responsibility within the Lodge.

You should also know that paying your dues makes it possible for the Lodge to run an effective program including executing quality inductions, supporting our Council, and providing important service to our camps. The accompanying pie charts illustrate the percentage breakdown of our income and expenses incurred by the Lodge in the 2003-2004 operating year. Currently, the Lodge operates on an annual budget of just over \$23,000. Of that amount, 44% comes from the payment of dues by our members. The second largest source of income is from property sales, which accounts for 33%. The rest of our income comes from revenue generated from our patch auctions (11%), the annual Trade-O-Ree (6%), and donations (6%).

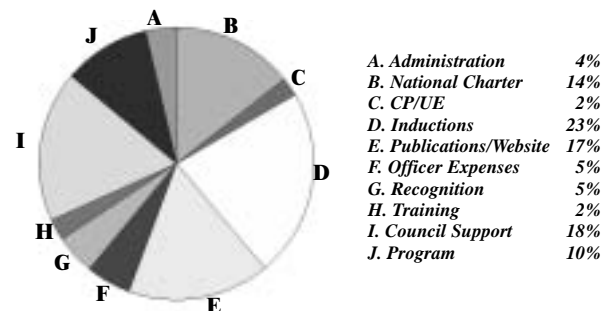
The Lodge has many expenses in order to operate and they can be seen on the expense pie chart. Our largest expenses are the costs associated with the inductions of Ordeal, Brotherhood, and Vigil members each year representing 23%. Although members pay a fee for their inductions, the Lodge supplements much of the costs. Our large expenses include Council support (18%), Publications (17%) and our National Charter Fee (14%).

Dues have not been raised in over 6 years and the committee thought that an increase was necessary to match increased operating costs. We appreciate your continued support of the Lodge program.

My Brothers, I have been carefully observing the CP/UE programs this year and I have a few comments. The CP stands for "Camp Promotion". One of the two major reasons for the visitation from the Order of the Arrow team is camp promotions. This means the direct promotion of our council camps, Treasure Island, Musser Scout Reservation and Resica Falls Scout Reservation. I have noted that many of the CP/UE visitations dwell on the Unit Election and the camp promotion is minimal or skipped all together.

The Order of the Arrow was founded at summer camp, for summer camp and to supplement the summer camp experience. What would Camp Hart be like without the ever present Lodge based leadership of Mike Hilferty? And how would the summer program at Resica have inducted so many new brothers without the ever vigilant Ryan Edmonds? And Treasure Island would certainly be short changed without the Honorsmaster work of Sluggo Kramer. The Lodge is part of summer camp and summer camp is part of the Lodge. Although Lodge weekends are fun and service and brotherhood abound, let us not forget our roots.

Too many troops are regularly going out of council for summer camp. Once this happens, the boys in the troop fall away from the

excitement and commitment of working on our camp staff. Without the fun, excitement and leadership training, they miss the chance to catch "Unami fever" and devote a lifetime to scouting, camping and our Lodge. Look around at our next Lodge event and you will see many, many adult leaders who started their life long commitment to Boy Scouts and the Order of the Arrow while serving on the camp staff of one of our council camps.

Occasionally, a troop may venture out of council for a summer. This can be a nice diversion and healthy for a large established troop. When encountering this on a CP/UE visitation, the team should not attempt to re-write a troop's current summer plan. It is however an opening to point out to the boys and the scoutmaster that although a pleasant diversion, a scout's opportunity to become part of the "Cradle of Liberty Home Team" by growing into a camp staff position is lost by not attending council camps. In addition, the opportunity to become an active member of Unami Lodge is jeopardized by too much time at out of council camps.

In closing, I must say that I continue to be proud of the Brotherhood as I keep my eternal Vigil, here on the Tea Table. Keep up the good work!

Service Update: Baker Project Nears Completion

I would like to start off by thanking everyone who helped out in anyway on the renovation of Baker Lodge. Without each of you, the project would not have been completed. I would especially like to thank Warren Marley for donating the steel beams to support the cabin and for his services with installing them. For all the people who were unable to make it up to Treasure Island to work on Baker Lodge, here is what we accomplished: replaced the beams that supported the floor, ripped out the old floor and floor joist in the whole cabin because the floor was all rotted, put new floor joist, sub-floor, and finished floor down, ripped off the old wall board and insulation, put new

Mark's position becomes effective June 1, 2004.



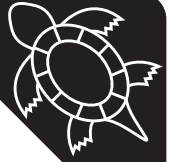

2003-2004 David Fortunato Outstanding Service Award Nomination Form



Deadline for submission: June 30, 2004

The David Fortunato Outstanding Service Award was established by the Lodge Executive Committee in November of 1996.

Dave served as a professional Scouter in the Philadelphia Council, and in a number of advisory positions in the Order of the Arrow as a volunteer. Dave became the Lodge Adviser of Delmont Lodge 43 in December of 1995, and his sage advice was instrumental in the successful completion of the merger of Delmont Lodge 43 and Unami Lodge, One.

Dave was selected to serve as the first Lodge Adviser to the new Unami Lodge. Unfortunately, Dave had been fighting cancer throughout this period. Because of his illness he resigned shortly after the merger became official in September of 1996. In October of 1996 Dave Fortunato passed away to join the other great scouters of the past. Dave never had a chance to witness the completion of his work, but he would be proud of how the Lodge has developed.

The David Fortunato Award for Outstanding Service is used to recognize those Arrowmen who do exactly that: serve their lodge, Unami to an outstanding degree. Unselfish service and an exemplary

performance of one's role in the lodge are the main factors considered by the selection committee.

Please provide as much information about the nominee as possible. In this way the Awards Selection Committee can make a fair assessment of the contributions of the nominee to the Lodge. To be eligible for the Outstanding Service Award an arrowman must:

1. Be registered in the Cradle of Liberty Council, BSA
2. Be a member in good standing of Unami Lodge, One

In order for a nomination to be accepted it must:

1. Be submitted on an official and current Outstanding Service Award Nomination form. Any additional information can be attached to the nomination form.
2. Be received no later then June 30, 2004.

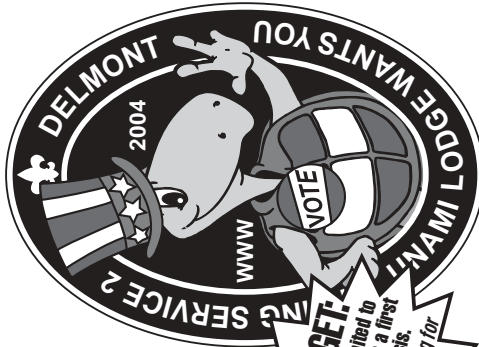
